ST PETER'S WOLVERCOTE CENTENARY TROPHY

First won in 1986

For outstanding exhibit in classes 5-8

Hint: if possible ensure your roses have not fully blown.

- 5 1 vase, 3 hybrid tea, any one variety
- 6 1 vase, 3 stems floribunda, any one variety
- 7 1 specimen bloom, hybrid tea (hint: single specimen, nip spare buds off, unsightly leaves) remove
- 8 1 specimen, any variety

PHYLLIS FOWLER ROSE BOWL

First won in 1967

For outstanding exhibit in class 9

- 9 One bowl of roses

ANNUALS AND PERENIALS

J. NEWMAN TROPHY

First won in 1994

For outstanding exhibit in class 10-12

- 10 1 vase of 3 stems of herbaceous annuals, one variety
- 11 1 vase of 3 stems of perennials, one variety
- 12 1 vase of mixed, 6 stems maximum

FLORAL ART

CHARLES ALLSOP TROPHY

First won in 1970

For outstanding exhibit in classes 14-17

- 14 An arrangement of flowers in a shoe or pair of shoes
- 15 'Shakespeare'
- 16 A floral hairpiece
- 17 A hanging basket

WOLVERCOTE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY FESTIVAL BOWL

First won in 2007

For outstanding exhibit in classes 18-20

- 18 Best dressed Doll, handmade clothes, not exceeding 61 cm
- 19 A peg doll
- 20 Rag doll

HERBS AND SALAD

JUBILEE CUP First won in 1977

For outstanding exhibit in classes 21-22

- 21 Bunch of herbs, 5 different kinds
- 22 Collection of 5 mixed salad items displayed in a bowl or on a plate

FRUIT

W. F. COULING CHALLENGE TROPHY

For outstanding exhibit in class 23

- 23. Dish of 5, one variety of any type of berries, redcurrants or blackcurrants

COOKERY

WOLVERCOTE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY CUP

First won in 1962

For outstanding exhibit in class 24-28

The judges may take this into consideration in awarding First, Second, or Third place. Judges will consider taste and texture, and in the event of a tie, presentation will be taken into consideration.

For outstanding exhibit in class 31-33

- 31 Painting or drawing, colour or black and white, to reflect Summer
- 32 Needlework, knitting or crochet
- 33 Paper mache work of art or a model. No restrictions other than your imagination

Entry is free, but age must be stated.

Please ensure your child's name is not visible on the entry.
